Summary of the Parish Council Meeting held on 13 May 2024

This was the first meeting of the new civic year and as such the first items of business were to elect the Chairman and Vice Chairman. Cllr Tim Suter was duly elected Chairman and Cllr Richard Sheehan duly elected Vice Chairman.

Councillors with specific responsibilities remain unchanged as follows: Planning & Communication – Cllr Lindsay Footpaths – Cllr Webster Allotments – Cllr Brown Millennium Wood – Cllr Sheehan Miss Cross Field & Playing Fields - Cllr Groves Village Hall – Cllr Woodrow

Matters Arising

Following discussion in March related to the financial donation by the Pumpkin Show for a bench in Millennium Wood, Cllr Sheehan had circulated three options together with costs.

Option 1: 'Standard' picnic bench setup of 1 x 1800mm table and 2 x 1800mm benches £1,494.02 excluding vat.

Option 2: Two x 1800mm tables to be set around the central oak tree in Millennium Wood - \pm 1,277.51 excl. vat. Sleeper benches to be sourced at a cost of \pm 70- \pm 100 each to provide seating. This will also work with 1200mm tables, though cost reduction is minimal.

Option 3: One x 2400mm table, quote to be obtained but given prices above anticipate £700 - £800 excl. vat. Benches to be sourced as per Option 2, although may be able to purchase 1 x 2400mm bench within budget if required.

Resolved to support Option 1 and purchase 1 x 1800mm table and 2 x 1800mm benches.

Planning

The following application was noted:

P24/S1156/DIS - Land off Rectory Road, Great Haseley

Discharge of conditions 4 (Surface water drainage), 5 (Foul water drainage), 8 (Glazing) and 15 (External lighting) on application P22/S4565/FUL (Erection of a 4 bedroomed detached family dwelling with integral garage, and associated access and landscaping).

It was noted that the District Planning Authority has granted permission for the following applications:

P24/S0493/HH - Olive Cottage, 3 Rectory Road, Great Haseley, OX44 7JS Single storey garden room to rear plus two rear facing ground floor windows

P24/S0783/FUL - North Weston Farm, North Weston, OX9 2HA

Change of use of existing grain store building to storage.

It was further noted that the following application had been withdrawn prior to determination:

P23/S4303/S73 - Land off Rectory Road, Great Haseley, OX44 7JS

Variation of condition 2 (Approved plans) in application P22/S4565/FUL (Erection of a 4 bedroomed detached family dwelling with integral garage, and associated access and landscaping- Variation of approved plans) - to allow for single story rear extension

Drainage Issues

Berrick Salome Parish Drainage Group has written to town and parish councils in the area to gauge the extent to which there are similar issues related to drainage and to ask whether councils would consider a joint approach to be beneficial or at least whether sharing information will provide reinforcement and enable councils to take stronger action independently.

It was agreed the Chairman will respond to the questions raised and confirm support of the initiative.

Projects

Public Art

Next step is to consult the village on the public art strategy.

Neighbourhood Priority Statement (NPS)

The District Neighbourhood Plan team has confirmed the number of responses to the consultation is adequate to move forward. The next stage is to draft the Neighbourhood Priority Statement.

Miss Cross Field & the Recreation Ground

Following work identified in the RoSPA play inspection report, members considered quotations received from a play equipment supplier. It was agreed to approach the landscape maintenance company who cut the grass to see whether they can quote to level the ground and install grass matting where required. Further quotes will be sought to purchase new swing seats and chains for equipment on the recreation ground. Repainting the swing frames will be added to the list of jobs for the next Tidy Day. A new basketball net will be purchased and installed.

The Natural History of Haseley: Hedgepig

I can't begin to describe how delighted I was to find a hedgehog wombling around the garden the other day. These lovely little animals, endearing to watch and very useful to the gardener for their services in munching up slugs and other bugs, are much scarcer than they used to be - I remember seeing several at a time fairly regularly in the garden when I was small but now a sighting is a rare experience.

The Hedgehog (Erinaceus europaeus) is Britain's only native spiny mammal. Just under 30cm long, round, brown and covered by around 7000 banded spines (actually modified hairs), it is one of our most familiar and recognisable wild animals. They are generally solitary, nocturnal and very wide-ranging, travelling 1-2 km per night in their search of the bugs and crunchy beetles that they enjoy eating (as well as the occasional bowl of cat or dog food left out by kindly people). This time of year (May-June) is the peak of their breeding season (a noisy affair that, understandably, involves a lot of perseverence and care from the hopeful male), and consequently a good time to provide safe and secure nesting sites. Suspected nest locations should not be disturbed as this risks the mother either deserting or eating her young, but with luck patience will be rewarded by the sight of hoglets tottering around the garden when the emerge from late June onwards.

There is considerable evidence for a dramatic decline in hedgehog numbers, other than anecdotal evidence such as my childhood memories; the population has declined by about a third since the millennium and is listed as 'vulnerable to extinction' on the IUCN red list for British mammals. The causes of this decline vary across their habitat range, with different pressures in urban and rural areas, but include factors such as increased use of pesticides, loss of hedgerows, overdevelopment and an increasing badger population (which considers hedgehogs to be the perfect midnight snack). Fortunately, hedgehogs love gardens and so there are many things that people can do to help prevent further decline and even help them to thrive once more, so that the sight of a hedgehog



snuffling in the garden is a common occurrence once again and not just a There are a lot of fond memory. gardens in Haseley and I would challenge everyone who enjoys the sight of these little animals to take the time this summer to do something to help give these lovely little animals a bit of a leg-up (for hints and tips on how this can be achieved visit www.hedgehogstreet.org).

Asparagus and Pancetta risotto By Hazel Leigh

Serves 4 Time to cook 40 mins.

450g (11b) asparagus spears 30ml (2tbsp) olive oil 2 x 70g packets pancetta (or bacon) roughly chopped 25g (1oz) butter 1 large onion, finely chopped 350g (12oz) risotto rice 1 litre (1¾pt) hot vegetable stock 300ml (½pt) dry white wine 50g (2oz) Parmesan cheese (finely grated) 45ml (3tbasp) fresh roughly chopped parsley

- 1. Trim the asparagus spears and cut of the tips. Cook the tips in a pan of boiling salted water for about 3-4 minutes until just tender. Drain and rinse under cold water, then set aside. Finely chop the rest of the asparagus spears. Heat 15ml (1tbsp) of the olive oil in a large, deep frying pan and fry the pancetta until just crisp. Remove from the pan with a slotted spoon and set aside.
- 2. Add the remaining oil and the butter to the frying pan and fry the onion under tender and lightly browned. Stir the risotto rice in and cook for 1 min. Mix together the vegetable stock and wine. Pour 300ml (½pt) of the stock mixture into the pan and simmer gently, stirring until all the liquid has been absorbed.
- 3. Add the chopped asparagus and continue adding the stock mixture, about a ladleful at a time, until nearly all the liquid is absorbed and the rice is tender. Season well with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Stir in the grated parmesan cheese and the chopped parsley and cook for 1 min. then gently stir in the asparagus tips and fried pancetta.

This is a very good basic risotto recipe and when asparagus is not in season, mushrooms and peas can be used instead.

The Rector's Pint

June 2024

I'm old enough to remember the 'winter of discontent' at the end of the 1970s, and the state of our public services, which were nationalised at the time. We might now ask, following forty years of privatisation, have things worked out for the better?

This last, very wet, winter and early spring brought things to a head with innumerable cases of discharge of untreated sewerage into our rivers and streams. The reason given is that this is due to 'unprecedented rainfall'. This was followed by a warning that there could be water shortages this summer, because we don't have the capacity to store enough water for all our needs in the face of possibly drier summers! We have been hearing for years that the weather is likely to become more unpredictable, but there seems to be a total lack of planning for that.

The water company shareholders will naturally expect a good return, but it seems this is at the cost of much-needed infrastructure. Agriculture also has a role to play. I love the lower Wye, but it has become heavily polluted, and the river flows a muddy brown and slime covers the rocks on the river bed. I wouldn't swim in it. The main culprits are the industrial-sized chicken farms in Herefordshire and Powys that have been licensed over the last decade. With so much dependent upon farming in the region I can't help wondering if there has been a conflict of interest in the granting of licenses. I can no longer now sing the hymn Jerusalem; 'In England's green and pleasant land' without some sadness.

The importance of creation lies at the heart of Christian theology. It goes right back to the first story in the Bible: 'and God saw all that he had made, and it was very good.' I do not believe that the first chapters of Genesis should be read as science. The understanding and culture of that time suggested that creation was the by-product of capricious forces, and that humans were the unfortunate victims. However, the Book of Genesis presents a very different picture, of a good God making a good creation, and in which humanity is given 'stewardship' in partnership with God, over this creation.

But stewardship is not permission to exploit. This is a very contemporary theme, but the Bible got there first! We must learn to do things differently. In the case of our rivers, when profit is king, they do not run clear.

On a happier note, June 8th sees the Great Milton Fete. The other two villages will not be hosting Fetes this year, instead there will be a Garden Party at Latchford Farm in Great Haseley on 29th June, and a "Mad Hatter's Tea Party" at Little Milton Manor on August 31st, so there's something wonderful to look forward to in all three parishes. I hope I'll see you there. Simon

John Howell MP writes...

The quality of the water in our rivers has been an ongoing concern for some time. It is therefore welcome news that DEFRA has announced that Wallingford Beach is to be given designated bathing waters status. Although the site is just over the bridge in the Wantage and Didcot Constituency I know that it is something that will be welcomed by people in this constituency. The site will be subject to the requirements under the Bathing Water Regulations 2013 and will be included in the Environment Agency's bathing water monitoring programme from this month. The Regulations require public information about water quality and potential sources of pollution to be available at all bathing waters during the bathing season, with local authorities in the areas responsible for providing this information. The Environment Agency will prepare a bathing water profile for the site, which will be available on its Swimfo website. They will also assess what action is needed to improve water quality to meet the standards set by the Bathing Water Regulations.

The internet is something that we have come to rely on for our daily business, for education, and for information and for leisure. However concerns to protect children have rightly been raised. In the middle of this month there was a debate in Westminster Hall on the impact of smart phones and social media on children with a call to ban smartphones for under 16s. I very much acknowledge the dangers of social media for young people and endorse the Online Safety Act which introduced measures to protect young people. However I do not agree with the proposal to ban young people from having smartphones. I believe that this is a decision for parents and not one for legislation. So rather than potentially criminalise people I think that, alongside the Online Harms Act, we should be looking to educate our young people on the risks and harms of social media. Many parents want their children to have a smartphone, as they provide benefits to children and parents, not least allowing them to stay connected while travelling alone. As this was a Westminster Hall debate it was an opportunity to formally raise the issue but there was no vote. I am sure that there will be further discussion on the issue.

There are many people in the constituency who live here on the basis of a visa. It is important to be aware that UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) are rolling out a digital immigration system which is more secure. Anyone who does not already have an eVisa will be required to have set up an online record by the end of this year. This information is also important for employers and landlords who will be able to check the immigration status of applicants much more easily.
